

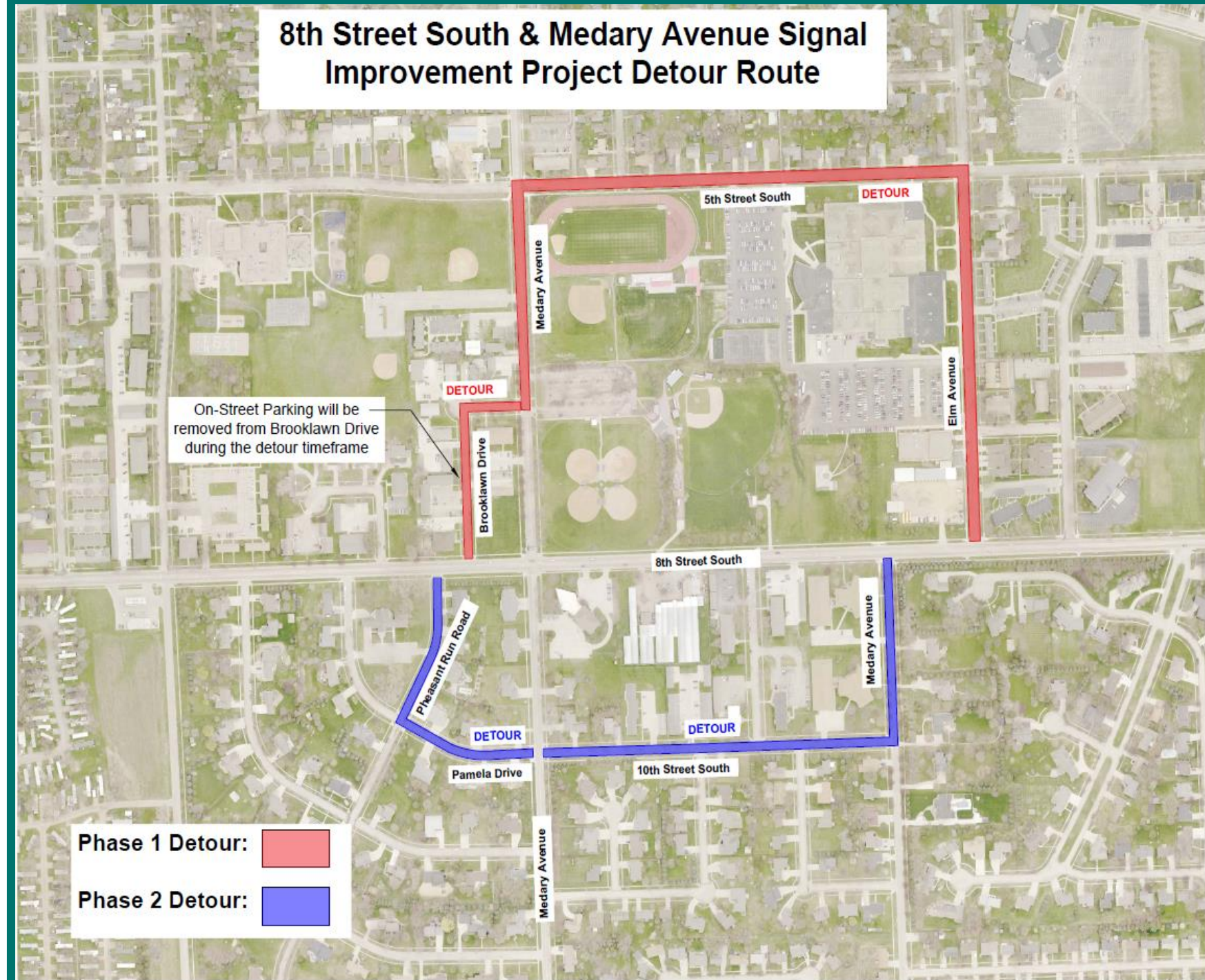

Select	Incident Type	Definition	Examples
<input type="radio"/>	Auto Accident - Private Property No Injury	A traffic collision with no injuries ; when a vehicle collides with another vehicle, animal, road debris, or other stationary obstruction, such as a tree, pole, or building.	You hit a mailbox, you rear end the vehicle in front of you, etc.
<input type="radio"/>	Harassment	Unwanted phone calls or contact of an annoying, harassing, or threatening nature.	Immediate hang-ups, obscene language, etc.
<input type="radio"/>	Hit and Run - Private Property	Leaving the scene of an accident without providing required license, insurance, or vehicle information.	Your vehicle was hit in a parking lot while you were inside a store, your vehicle was hit while it was parked in the street overnight, etc.
<input type="radio"/>	Lost Property	Property that is missing, leaving items in restaurant, etc.	You lost an earring while walking downtown, you left your jacket at a restaurant, etc.
<input type="radio"/>	Theft	Your property is taken without your permission. The value of the stolen property must be less than \$1,000. Lost property is not a theft.	Your yard ornament is stolen, your backpack is stolen, etc.
<input type="radio"/>	Theft from Vehicle	Your property is taken from your vehicle without your permission. The value of the stolen property must be less than \$1,000.	Your jacket is stolen from your backseat, your hubcaps are stolen, etc.
	Vandalism	The act of changing, modifying, or defacing public or private property. The damage amount must be less than \$1000.	Graffiti, knocking over mailbox, throwing rock through windows, etc.
